Senate Bill 1180, 86th Legislature, requires that the Texas Veterans Commission provide a report, on December 1st of each year, to the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and each member of the Legislature. In accordance with Texas Government Code Title 2., Subtitle K., Chapter 124, the contents of the report must contain Veteran Treatment Court information from the preceding fiscal year, to include (a) the number of veteran defendants who participated in each veteran's treatment court program, (b) the number of veteran defendants that successfully completed each program, (c) the number of veteran defendants that did not successfully complete the program, and (d) the amount of grant funding received by each Veteran Treatment Court program must also be included in the report.

Texas Government Code defines a veteran treatment court program as having the following essential characteristics: 1) the integration of services in the processing of cases in the judicial system; (2) the use of a nonadversarial approach involving prosecutors and defense attorneys to promote public safety and to protect the due process rights of program participants; (3) early identification and prompt placement of eligible participants in the program; (4) access to a continuum of alcohol, controlled substance, mental health, and other related treatment and rehabilitative services; (5) careful monitoring of treatment and services provided to program participants; (6) a coordinated strategy to govern program responses to participants' compliance; (7) ongoing judicial interaction with program participants; (8) monitoring and evaluation of program goals and effectiveness; (9) continuing interdisciplinary education to promote effective program planning, implementation, and operations; (10) development of partnerships with public agencies and community organizations, including the United States Department of Veterans Affairs; and (11) inclusion of a participant's family members who agree to be involved in the treatment and services provided to the participant under the program.

Texas Veterans Commission's Veterans Mental Health Department (VMHD) is pleased to present the Veterans Treatment Court Program Annual Report for 2021. The VMHD was formally created by HB19 of the 84th Legislature in 2015 and is focused on ensuring access to competent mental health services for service members, veterans, and their families. VMHD accomplishes this task by providing training, certification, and technical assistance across Texas. In addition to directly connecting veterans and families to local mental health and supportive services, VMHD works with partners at the national, state, and local levels to address veteran-specific issues including suicide prevention, veteran homelessness, military cultural competency, peer support services, military-related trauma, women and rural veterans, and justice involvement. Across all VMHD programming, services including training and technical assistance are offered freely to all who are in need. A crucial program within the VMHD is the Justice Involved Veteran Program which works to improve veteran services across the entire criminal justice continuum.

A crucial function of the Justice Involved Veteran (JIV) Program is to serve as a resource providing technical assistance and training to all Veteran Treatment Courts across Texas. JIV Coordinators also collaborate with the local jails, sheriff departments, and statewide stakeholders including the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to better ensure that incarcerated veterans have access to veteran-specific services and programming. The JIV Program also partners with local and state law enforcement to deliver officers relevant trainings on trauma affected veterans, crisis intervention strategies, and suicide prevention. Despite the challenges of the past year, in FY 20201the JIV Program supported the efforts of 45 different Courts, provided training to 1,693 criminal justice professionals, and responded to over 1,700 requests for assistance from justice involved veterans which resulted in 4,672 referrals to mental health and supportive services.

The Veterans Mental Health Department acknowledges and recognizes the continued dedication and excellent work of the Courts as they make meaningful and lasting impact on the lives of our veterans and veteran families across Texas. Veteran Mental Health Department's Justice Involved Veteran Coordinators are committed to reaching out to and working with counties who are interested in starting Treatment Courts in their areas and ensuring best practices across the state. We also want to commend our state leaders for their continued support of our veterans and their efforts to fulfill our promises to Texas veterans. Texas continues to lead the nation in serving our veterans, and is widely recognized as the "Texas Model," which is known for its superior service to veterans and their families. Veterans have showed a continued desire to settle or relocate to Texas, which is home to the second largest veteran population in the nation, estimated at 1.7 million. Despite the dedicated efforts of those working to assist veterans with mental health issues, there remains a persistent need and demand for veteran mental health services. Thank you for giving the members of Texas Veterans Commission's Veterans Mental Health Department the opportunity to contribute to this important work.
