How to become an Accredited Veteran County Service Officer (VCSO). Here is what you need to know:

You MUST:

- 1. Be Employed by a County in the State of Texas
- 2. Appointed by that County's Judge
- 3. Work 1000+ hours per year
- 4. Successfully complete Initial Training
- 5. Pass the Training, Responsibility, and Involvement in Claims Preparation (TRIP) Course
- 6. Complete Online VA courses on HIPAA, Privacy, Information Security, Rules of Behavior, and more.
- 7. Complete 12 hours of Continuing Education (CE) annually
- 8. Pass a Background check by the Department of Veterans Affairs

Once you are employed and appointed; TVC can then provide access to the Veterans Service Officer Liaison, Laura Bivens (laura.bivens@tvc.texas.gov) to assist with:

- 1. Initial Training
- 2. TRIP Training
- 3. Online VA Courses
- 4. Completing CE
- 5. Badging and Access to VA systems

Per State and Federal Regulations those who are:

- 1. Volunteers
- 2. People employed by 501 (c) (3)
- 3. Non-County Employees

cannot be Accredited and will not be eligible to advise veterans, fill out claims, and/or submit claims on the veteran's behalf.

County Judges:

You must certify in writing that your VCSO:

- 1. Is a County Employees
- 2. Is Appointed by you as the Veteran County Service Officer
- 3. That the VCSO will work 1000+ hours annually

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
